Today I take my text from something once said to the Lord Jesus by a gentile centurion (Matt. 8. 8<sup>1</sup>):

## 'speak the word only'.

King Solomon<sup>2</sup> once wrote, 'Where *the word of a king* is, there is power' (Eccles. 8. 4<sup>3</sup>). How much greater therefore the power wielded by the word of Him who is *the 'King of kings*' (Rev. 17. 14; 19. 16) – by the word of One far 'greater than Solomon' (Matt. 12. 42).

And, throughout the days of our Lord's so-called 'Public Ministry', He demonstrated time after time that His word carried immense, *seemingly* invincible, power.

(i) No *disease or bodily sickness* could withstand the power of His word. By way of example, you have only to ask the paralytic of the following chapter (Matt. 9. 2-7).

(ii) **Distance** was no match for the power of His word. You have only to ask (a) the centurion who provided me with my text, or (b) the royal official whose dying 'child' had been healed at a distance of almost 20 miles<sup>4</sup> (John 4. 46-54<sup>5</sup>).

(iii) **Demons** were not proof against the power of His word. You have only to ask (a) Mary Magdalene (Luke 8. 2), (b) the man with the unclean spirit in the synagogue (Mark 1. 23-27), (c) the man named 'Legion' (Mark 5. 1-13), or (d) the father of the young child at the foot of the Mount of Transfiguration (Mark 9. 14-29).<sup>6</sup>

(iv) *The devil* himself could not resist the power of His word. Jesus had only to command, 'Go, Satan!' and 'the devil left Him' (Matt. 4. 8-11).<sup>7</sup>

(v) **Death** (the so-called '*king* of terrors', Job 18. 14) could not counter the power of the word of *this King*! You have only to ask (a) Jairus and his wife (Mark 5. 22, 41-42), (b) the widow of Nain (Luke 7. 12-15), or (c) the sisters from Bethany (John 11. 1, 43-44).

Yes, all of these (disease, distance, demons, devil and death) were subject to the power of His word.

But so too were (vi) the natural elements. You have only to ask His fearful disciples (Mark 4. 39).8

In summary, neither *disease nor distance* – neither *demons nor devil* – neither *death nor the elements* – were a match for the Saviour's mighty word.

Not that this should surprise us. For His was the powerful word (i) which once *made all* things (Psa. 33. 6, 9<sup>9</sup>), (ii) which now *upholds all* things (Heb. 1. 3<sup>10</sup>), and (iii) which one day will *destroy all* His foes (Rev. 19. 15<sup>11</sup>).

Oh, yes, it certainly *seemed* that there was *nothing* which this King could *not* accomplish by speaking *'the word only'.* 

Ah, but, there was <u>one thing</u> (just one thing) which lay altogether outside the range of His powerful word.

And *that* was my salvation. *That* would cost Him, *not His word, but His very life*. That would cost Him the suffering of the cross!

Let us thank God today that we can each say, 'the Son of God ... loved me and gave *Himself* for me' (Gal. 2. 20).

## Notes

<sup>1</sup> Many people 'marvelled' at the Lord Jesus and His words and works; for example, in Luke's Gospel alone, in Luke 2. 33; 4. 22; 8. 25; 9. 43; 11. 14; 20. 26; 24. 41. (The word 'marvel' translates the Greek word ' $\theta \alpha \dot{\mu} \alpha \xi \omega$ ', although in several verses some translations render the word ' $\theta \alpha \dot{\mu} \alpha \xi \omega$ ' in various ways.)

But there are only two occasions when we read that the Lord Himself marvelled; (i) here at the 'great faith' of a gentile centurion in Capernaum, Matt. 8. 10; Luke 7. 9, and, (ii) in Mark 6 at the 'unbelief' of a Jewish congregation in His own town of Nazareth, Mark 6. 6.

The Lord Jesus needed neither rod nor robe to *master* the surging waves of the sea; His powerful word was sufficient.
