(i) Scripture.

For there is no distinction: for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, and are justified by His grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, whom God put forward as a propitiation by His blood, to be received by faith.

This was to show God's righteousness, because in His divine forbearance He had passed over former sins. It was to show His righteousness at the present time, so that He might be just and the justifier of the one who has faith in Jesus.

(ii) Food for thought.

The incarnation and virgin birth of the Lord Jesus.

'His *incarnation* is the *fact* that He became man; His *virgin birth* is the *means* by which He became man

'Me' in John's Gospel.

- (i) 'Unto me': Attraction (John 12. 32).
- (ii) 'Against me': <u>Treason</u> (John 13. 18).
- (iii) 'By me': Access (John 14. 6).
- (iv) 'Without me': Failure (John 15. 5).
- (v) 'In me': Peace (John 16. 33).
- (vi) 'With me': Glory (John 17. 24).

The believer in John chapters 10-13.

The believer belongs to:

- (i) The 'one flock' (John 10. 16).
- (ii) The 'children of God' (John 11. 52).
- (iii) The 'much fruit' (John 12. 24).
- (iv) 'His own' (John 13. 1).

'His own'.

Paradoxically, the Lord Jesus did not suffer or die for any sins of His own (for He had none), but He did suffer and die for all the sins of 'His own' (John 13. 1 with 1 Cor. 15. 3).

The Lord's prayer for 'His own' in John 17.

- (i) That they may be kept loyal to the Father's 'name' ('character) which Jesus has revealed (v. 11).
- (ii) That they may share the full measure of His joy (v. 13).
- (iii) That they may be kept from the evil one (v. 15).
- (iv) That they may be set apart for God's service through God's truth (vv. 17, 19).
- (v) That they may enjoy complete unity with all other believers (vv. 21-23).

(vi) That they may one day be with Him and behold His heavenly glory (v. 24).

The ascension of the Lord Jesus.

- 1. '<u>Up</u>':
- (i) 'He was *received* up' (Mark 16. 19).
- (ii) 'He was ... carried up' (Luke 24. 51).
- (iii) 'He was taken up' (Acts 1. 9).
- (iv) 'He ascended up' (Eph. 4. 8.)
- 2. 'The heavens':
- (a) He 'passed *through* the heavens' (Heb. 4. 14 literal translation).
- (b) He is 'made *higher* than the heavens' (Heb. 7. 26.
- (c) He 'ascended up far above all heavens' (Eph. 4. 10).
- (d) He 'entered ... into heaven itself' (Heb. 9. 24).

[He has 'entered' as (i) Forerunner (Heb. 6. 20), (ii) Redeemer (Heb. 9. 12), and (iii) Representative (Heb. 9. 24).]

'Your word is truth' (John 17. 17): 'he is a liar' (John 8. 44).

'Adam learned the hard way that the devil lies and God tells the truth. Since then, almost everything has changed, but this hasn't: the devil's still lying, and God's still telling the truth'.

Examples of threefold evil.

- (i) 'The lust of the flesh, and the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life' (1 John 2. 16).
- (ii) 'The dragon ... the beast, and ... the false prophet' (Rev. 16. 13).
- (iii) 'The leaven of the Pharisees and of the Sadducees ... and of Herod' (Matt. 16. 6; Mark 8. 15).
- (iv) 'The way of Cain ... the error of Balaam ... the gainsaying of Core' Jude 11.

'The fruit of the Spirit' (Gal. 5. 22).

'Every gardener knows that mature fruit does not appear overnight. It takes time to grow — and so does the fruit of the Spirit in our lives. Start tending your garden today'. (Billy Graham, 'Peace for Each Day'.)

Two ways in which God's grace can be abused:

- (i) Legalism: 'You are severed from Christ, you who would be justified by the law; you have *fallen* away from grace' (Gal. 5. 4).
- (ii) Antinomianism (the belief that there are no moral laws and that men are not required to live holy lives): 'ungodly men, who *pervert* the grace of our God into sensuality' (Jude 4).

The apostle Paul's conviction about the timing of the Lord's return.

'1 Thessalonians 4. 17 ['we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air'] no more proves Paul believed Christ would return during his lifetime than 1 Corinthians 6. 14 ['God both raised up the Lord and will also *raise us up* by His power] proves he thought Christ would not return in his lifetime ... Although he uses the first person in both places, Paul is simply identifying himself with the Christians who will enjoy these experiences—whether meeting the Lord and thus escaping death, or dying and ultimately rising from the dead'.
